





# Where we began

- In 2015, Mayor Soglin signed on to the mayor's challenge to end veteran homelessness.
- At the same time, the Homeless Services Consortium signed up to be part of Zero: 2016. (now called Built for Zero)
- Original Goals: Homeless Services Consortium Leadership and Board will lead effort to end homelessness for 130 veterans by 2015, 135 chronically homeless by 2016 and 400 families by 2017.
- Engage individuals with current or past experience of homelessness, elected officials, housing and service providers, advocates, landlords, developers and funders.
- Use coordinated entry, provide comprehensive wrap-around services, and make data driven decisions.
- Homelessness will be brief, rare and a one-time experience.










## Veterans housed 2015-2020












## 2020 Updates - Veterans

- Average outflow for 2020 is 4.08 Veterans
- 2020 average inflow rate is 6 Veterans
- Veterans currently homeless Do not have current numbers due to HMIS transition










# People experiencing chronic homelessness housed in 2015-2020












## 2020 Updates - Chronic

- 2020 average inflow rate is 11.67 individuals

# What does this work look like in our community?

- Built for Zero Team
  - Meets monthly: review data, discuss new projects
- Chronic Inflow Project (on hold)
- Coaching Calls
  - Torrie and Sarah participate in regular calls
- Attend learning sessions (currently virtual)
- Work originating with Built for Zero: outreach meetings, vet case conferencing meetings, vulnerable population case conferencing (new), relationship building with Veteran providers, regular data review of Veteran and Chronic homelessness







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## Current Work

In 2021, the Madison/Dane County Built for Zero Team commits to reviewing and revising our community's prioritization process and policies. We will embark on this process with commitments to racial equity, reaching functional zero and performing improvement work as a team. In order for this work to be done correctly, we are committed to slowing down and taking the time to include all voices, being open to new ideas and being uncomfortable. At the end of 2021, we will have a process that will be racially equitable and work towards our goals of reaching functional zero.
